- + Changing climate and energy system:
 - More extreme weather, including heatwaves
 - Costs of rapid transition to clean energy
 - Growth in distributive energy (rooftop solar)
- + People on low-incomes or experiencing disadvantaged are most effected by climate change impacts and a poor transition to a clean economy. Least able to cope, adapt and recover.
- + We know low carbon homes can help people become more resilient to climate change impacts, reduce energy bills, improve health and well being, and contribute to emissions reductions.
- + People on low incomes or experiencing disadvantage are at risk of being left behind because they pay disproportionately more for essential services and have less choice and control.
- + Risks:
 - Increase in inequality
 - Overlook co-benefits of Energy efficiency
- + Barriers
 - Cost
 - Access



PRIORITISE INVESTMENT SO NO-ONE IS LEFT BEHIND

- + All new housing Raise minimum energy efficiency standards for all new builds.
- + **Private rental** Introduce **mandatory energy efficiency standards** for rental properties and phase in rooftop solar and provide tax incentives to support upgrade.
- + Public housing Federal and state governments invest in best practice energy efficiency and solar for all new public housing builds. Provide additional support to upgrade public and community housing stock in each state.
- + **Home owners** Federal, state, local councils and energy retailers work cooperatively together to cofund <u>ongoing</u> programs for low-income and disadvantage households to provide access to energyefficient knowledge, products & solar PV.
- + Indigenous Communities Prioritise Invest in clean energy and energy efficiency for remote indigenous communities
- + **Pilot new technologies** with low-income and disadvantaged households.
